

## N INSTITUTE CARES Act: Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund

- Elevate Salon Institute signed and returned to the Department of Education the Certification and Agreement as well as the assurance that it has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
- The total amount of funds that the Institute has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students is \$44360.
- The total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of the date of submission is \$44360.
- The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is 20.
- The total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is 24.
- The method(s) used by the institution to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is described as:

Elevate Salon Institute Chubbuck has a large percentage of financially needy students as evidenced by the lower EFC's on the ISIR's. Therefore the institute determined that all students who were enrolled and attending or who subsequently enrolled after the National Emergency was declared on March 13, 2020. And met the Department of Education's requirements, will receive a portion of the funds available from the student portion of the funds.

Maximum grants did not exceed the maximum Pell Grant award, nor were they below the minimum threshold of \$250 per student. The Disbursements were one time disbursements.

Eligible students were Title IV eligible or had completed a FAFSA and had met all or the requirements of eligibility demonstrated by showing a valid EFC for documentation or based on information from the department 5/21/2020, were enrolled as regular students, in eligible programs offered by the Institute.

Students were advised of their eligibility due to the disruption of campus operations due to the Coronavirus and the eligible expenses were food, housing, course materials technology, health care and child care. Students signed acknowledgements and receipt of these funds and checks were issued from a special designated account.

All funds were issued to eligible students by October 30, 2020. The special account is being closed pending the last check clearing the account and as this is a final report for the student portion, no further reporting is required.
